A way to remember HOW to form these sneaky phrases!

"from" - <u>ABlative</u> use the endings $\underline{-\bar{o}}$ or $\underline{-\bar{a}}$ ex: from Rome = $\underline{Rom\bar{a}}$

"to" - <u>ADcusative</u> use the endings <u>um</u> or <u>am</u>
ex: to Rome = <u>Romam</u>

"in" - glNitive use the endings <u>ī</u> or <u>ae</u>

ex: in Rome = Romae
